




KS3 Rewards trip

Science

Physics - Year 9 have been working through their molecules and matter topic; we have studied density and changes of state. They have been developing their science skills and completed their first GCSE required practical, finding the density of regular and irregular shaped objects.


Chemistry – We have been studying the history and structure of the atom, including electronic structure. Students are now discovering who designed the periodic table and learning about key groups within it, such as the highly reactive group 1 metals!

Biology – Our Year 9s have been learning about the body and how certain systems in the body work. How we digest our food, how we get blood around from our heads to our toes and how we manage to get the oxygen we need.

Year 9 Geography students study a range of locations around the world. They started off by investigating whether the geography of Russia is a curse or a benefit and had to reach a decision on their thoughts on this in their assessment.

More recently they have been studying the Middle East and why it is such an important world region. Part of this has involved studying Dubai and why it is such a popular place for tourists.





Our study of the world travels to South America next with students studying the Amazon Rainforest and comparing this to life in a shanty town in Rio De Janeiro.

Technology

During this rotation Year 9 Product Design students have worked with a range of materials, tools and equipment to produce a desk lamp. Students have carried out product analysis of existing products and completed a redesign task.

In Textiles students have conducted research into the environmental issues caused by the fashion industry. Using this theme students have designed and made cushions using a range of different decorative techniques and processes.

The food students have continued to develop cooking skills from the previous year and investigate what happens at different life stages looking at the impact a poor diet can have on your health. Students have also conducted sensory testing experiments to gain first-hand experience of the food industry.



Year 9 will be learning about how data is analysed next term in the Data Science unit



History

This term students have been learning about what life was like in 19th Century London with a particular focus on the Jack the Ripper murders. Using careful source analysis pupils have examined evidence about the victims, compared eyewitness accounts and analysed a list of suspects to make judgements about who was likely to have been the murderer.

More recently, students have been continuing learning from Year 8 in considering the impacts of the Great War on Germany and how this led to the rise of the Nazi party. Students have been considering the positives and negatives of the short-lived Weimar government and discussed why the Nazi party appealed to the German people at this time using a mixture of texts, video clips and historical documents.

Upcoming Curriculum/Events:

Next term Year 9 will be following on chronologically from what they have been learning this term. They will be learning about key events and battles during WW2 such as the Blitz, Dunkirk and Pearl Harbour, as well as how the conflict affected Hull.

Following on from this, students will be learning about what life was like in Germany at this time for Jewish people during the Holocaust. Pupils will learn about the historic origins of antisemitism, how these attitudes were utilised by the Nazi party and consider the experiences of those forced to become victims of these beliefs.


Music

During the first term of Year 9 our students have been looking at different styles of popular music. We started at the beginning of the year exploring Britpop, students were introduced to popular artists and songs from the time before they developed their performance skills by learning part of a Britpop song.

We then moved onto the 80s exploring Synthpop. Students have been developing performances of catchy hooks from popular songs, as well as having a go at creating their own hooks for a Synthpop song.



Students in the Spotlight leading the way for House points for each year group:


Tawfiq M (9C2) with 558 points, Finn D (9C2) with 515 points, and Tilly L (9C3) with 444 points.


